







It's Never Too Early to Teach Your Child by READING and TALKING to Them!

READING

 Read EVERYTHING with children: street and wall signs, box or can labels, shopping lists, and books.



- Hold your children in your lap and read together every day.
 - Talk about the pictures.
 - Describe the colors, animals, and objects.
 - Count the legs, ears, or even spots on animals.
 - Look at the clothes people are wearing. Ask "Do you think it's cold or hot where they are?"
 - Use silly voices for different characters.
- Look for **emotions** on faces. Ask "How do you think the girl is feeling?"
 - Talk about your feelings and ask children to do the same.
 - Use the **photos on the back** of this sheet for a fun "How Are You Feeling?" game.

TALKING

- Children, even babies, need to hear language to learn to speak.
 Talk about EVERYTHING you're doing while you're doing it!"
 - "We're waiting for the bus. I wonder when it will get here?"
 - "We're going to the store. What should buy?"
 - "I know you like milk let's get some milk."

Even before children can talk, they are **listening**, building their stockpile of words for when they are ready to speak.

Give them LOTS of words to choose from!

- Ask questions that encourage children to think and speak.
 - "What is that animal called? What is the squirrel doing?"
 - Make up stories while you're riding in the car or waiting in line.
 - Say, "Wow! There sure is a lot of traffic! I wonder where all these people are going?
 - Encourage kids to ask questions or tell their own silly stories.



~ Remember ~

Children who are read to from an early age enter school **ready** to learn!

Reading with children builds their **vocabulary** – the **most important tool** when learning to read!


Children who are read to **before** they begin school are more likely to want to learn to read – the **key** predictor in later **school success** and **graduation rate!**

RHYME & SING

- Saying nursery rhymes and singing with children helps them **hear** the rhythm and flow of our language. It gets their ears "tuned in" to the sounds of speech.
- **SING with your children!** Don't worry about knowing "baby" songs, just sing what you're doing!

"Wash, wash, wash your hands! Scrubba, scrubba, scrub!" can be sung to the tune of "Row, Row, Row Your Boat."
